Interview with former mobility programme participants

We interviewed 20 people from different backgrounds to learn about the impact of their past mobility project. Some of them came to UK from abroad and others went abroad from the UK. The participating countries were Italy, Portugal, France, Spain, Belgium, Lithuania, Germany, Poland and Slovakia. We talked both to people who did a work placement and to those who had participated in a study experience. The purpose was to explore how studying or working abroad changes one's life and how could we improve these EU funded programmes.

"It made me definitely more confident, more outgoing, I still have friends even though we don't live in the same city anymore. It has been 10 years now we have been in touch and it had a huge impact on my personal life."

"It gave me a great deal of experiences in terms when adjusting to new circumstances it also gave me valuable experience and knowledge of other cultures of how to behave around other people."
